

ACTIVITY TIME

My First Coloured Shapes

Read through the book together and let your toddler hold the book. Your child may like to touch or trace each shape and say what colours they can see. Which is your child's favourite shape? Or favourite colour? Ask them why it is their favourite colour/shape?

This book is simple to allow for conversations about each shape. It also is a good book for you to read or talk in your home language. When children have a strong foundation in their home language then it is easier for them to learn English or other languages. Recycle some simple items from around your home to make some binoculars. Your child can then become a colour or shape detective.

Colour or Shape Detective Binoculars

You will need:

- Colour or Shape Detective Binoculars template
- Cardboard rolls
- Paper
- Strip of paper
- Milk container lid
- Scissors
- Crayons or colouring in pencils
- Sticky tape.

Instructions:

- 1. Decorate the paper.
- 2. Tape cardboard rolls together.
- 3. Wrap the paper around the rolls and tape the paper ends together.
- 4. Tape your lid on the front of the binoculars.
- 5. Tape on the strip of paper as the strap.

STEM focus:

- Look for shapes around your home, or when you are out and about.
 Can you spy a square window, rectangle door, round plate? What other shapes or colours can you find with your binoculars?
- Use coloured chalk on the pavement and draw shapes like the ones in the book.

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Adult supervision is essential. Involve and talk with your child as much as possible.










You will need:

milk container lid




strip of paper




What to do:




1. decorate paper
